Introduction

In mid to late 2015, the Solera® Awning LED light connectors (for the light in the roll tube or the lighted fabric applications) were changed as a product improvement. This change was made on a running basis at the manufacturer's level.

The old style connector was white (Fig. 1). The new style connector is a black (Fig. 2). The two connectors are not compatible with each other.

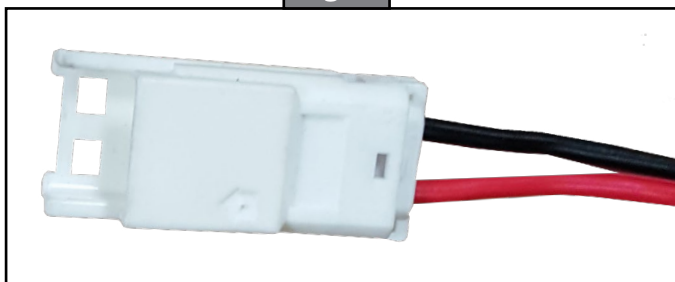
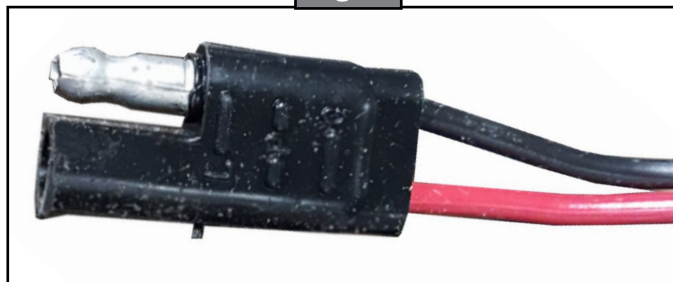

If LED Lights Need To Be Replaced:

1. If the unit has the black connector (Fig. 2) on the end of the LED lights, only new lights will be needed. The new lights will come with the black connector that will match the connector on the idler head on the awning assembly.

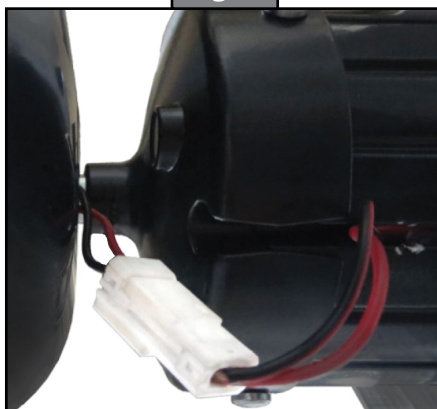
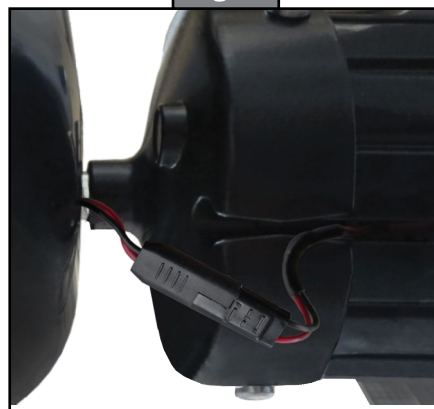


Fig. 4



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

2. If the unit has a white connector (Fig. 1) on the LED lights, new lights and a new idler head assembly will be needed. The new lights will come with the black connector which is not compatible with the white connector. The new idler head will have the black connector to match the black connector on the new lights. The connection point is between the idler head and the end of the roll tube (Fig. 3 and Fig. 4).
